




Why the focus on Fair Access?

- Women and girls often report that they don't receive equal access to playing spaces and other sporting resources
- And when they do receive access to the best quality facilities, it's often at inconvenient times



Fair Access in Practice



Roles in policy rollout

ΑII

Ensure women and girls are provided participation in opportunities that work for them. Champion fair access and ensure we all do our part to create welcoming and safe environments.

State government (OWSR)

Supports councils to have policies place. Work with sports sector to implement policies.

Councils

Own and implement their policy

State Sport Association

Supports clubs and leagues when policies come into play.

Leagues

Work with AFL and Netball Victoria and councils in delivering policy actions to clubs.

Clubs

Understand what your council's policy means for your club, connect with your league.

Fair Access Principles

- Provide guidance to councils and the sport and active recreation sector on how women and girls can be included, welcomed and treated fairly in community sport
- Are not mandatory, but act as added support and guidance material
- Variations of these principles will be demonstrated in council policies



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Principle		Examples	
1	Community sports infrastructure and environments are genuinely welcome, safe and inclusive	 Respectful language is used on and off the field Inclusive and non-offensive photos being displayed in club rooms 	
2	Women and girls can fully participate in all aspects of community sport and active recreation, including as a player, coach, administrator, official, volunteer and spectator	 Provide spectators and visitors with access to all amenities, including bathrooms and baby change facilities. 	
3	Women and girls will have equitable access to and use of community sport infrastructure	 Consider modified or participation based programs that may attract new people to your club such as AFL 9's, 3X3 Hustle, Freestyle Golf or Hockey Sixer 	rs

Principle		Examples
4	Women and girls should be equitably represented in leadership and governance roles	 Support and ecourage women and girls to complete their coach/official accreditation Create a coaching mentor program or pathway to support women in developing their skills and experience within your sport
5	Encourage and support all user groups who access and use community sport infrastructure to understand, adopt and implement gender equitable access and use policies	 Set expectations early through player and coach codes of conduct, including the Fair Play Code Lead by example: coaches, committee members and leadership groups show commitment to creating an inclusive environment
6	Prioritise use and support to all user groups who demonstrate an ongoing commitment to gender equitable access and use of allocated community sport infrastructure	Recognise individuals or groups who value and demonstrate inclusion and fairness with an end of season award

Next steps

Everyone: Be a champion for fair, welcome and inclusive behaviours.

- Club committees: Contact your council to understand what will be in their policy, and when it will come into play.
- **Leagues:** Contact your relevant State Sporting Association to discuss the ways in which they will support Fair Access (e.g., through education and training for clubs).

Club grants: Change Our Game Community Activation Grants Program

- Grants of up to \$10,000 are available for community sport and active recreation clubs
- Applications close at 5pm, Monday 4 March

Stream 1: Participation

Grants of up to \$10,000 to support participation of women and girls in community sport and active recreation (e.g. Come and try day)

Stream 2: Capability

Grants of up to \$10,000 to support clubs to undertake education and training opportunities (e.g. gender equity training to support Fair Access policy requirements)

Stream 3: Community Leaders

Grants of up to \$5,000 to support women to access professional development opportunities (e.g. Coach accreditation course)
